Flooding Advice and Sandbag Policy**

Flood warnings from the Environment Agency (EA)

The Environment Agency (EA) is responsible for issuing flood warnings to the Police, the Fire and Rescue Service, to the relevant local authorities and the general public.

There are three levels of Flood Warning, with Severe being the most serious. There is usually a particular risk of flooding in Exmouth when very high tides are combined with severe wind.



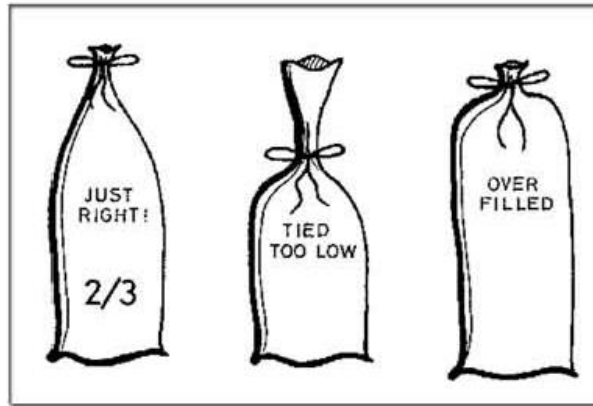

Sand Bags - how to get them and how to use them

If you are at risk of flooding, don't wait until it is too late to act. Exmouth Town Council has a supply of bags which can be collected from our office at 44, Rolle Street during normal office hours (that's Monday to Thursday, between 9.00am and 5.00pm; Friday 9.00am-4.30pm) or from AJ Taxis (7am to midnight) in The Strand. The notice board at the Town Hall also has contact details of those Councillors available over the Christmas and New Year period who can issue sand bags in an emergency.

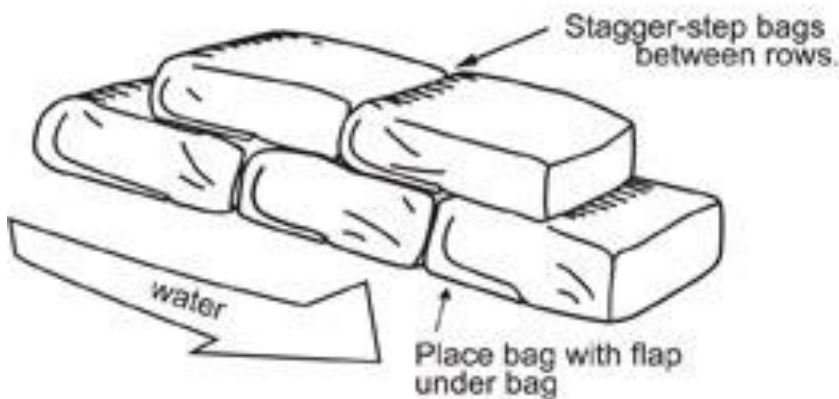
You will need to use your own builder's sand or you can collect sand which has overtopped onto the road along the sea front but *you must not take sand from the beach*. You can also fill sand bags with garden soil but make sure you stamp it down so there are no gaps. The important thing is that they get heavy really quickly, so don't overfill them! Then, you just tuck the open end under the bag. In anything other than a severe flood, a height of two sandbags is usually enough, overlapping like bricks in a wall, with a plastic sheet or bin bag laid on the ground underneath.

FILLING SANDBAGS



In a serious flood, the door is not the only place the water will come in; you need to think about toilets, sinks, floorboards and airbricks as well. You don't necessarily need a sandbag for the sink; you just need something heavy to hold the plug in place, so it doesn't get pushed out. But you can also put a sandbag down your toilet (in the bowl itself) and that stops the water coming up.
